

A Summer of Cautious and Prayerful Optimism: Christians are no strangers to hope. The resurrection of Jesus ensures our hope. As we move into the summer months, there are new reasons to hope that our past year and a half of strict precautions will soon be ending. New recommendations from national and local health officials as well as the trends of illness, especially severe illness and death, due to Covid-19 are on the decline in our country. Thanks be to God!

To that end, we will begin a new phase of protocols here at St. John's beginning on June 6th. This date is convenient for several reasons. First, there are already some changes planned for that date, and introducing them all at once is more efficient than rolling them out piecemeal. Second, St. John's Lutheran School dismisses for the summer on June 4th. The school will maintain its current protocols through the end of the school year, and June 6th is a natural day to adjust our practices in the church without worrying about conflicting with school protocols.

What's going to change? First, we will return to our single morning service at 9:30AM beginning June 6th. The guidance for occupancy during Illinois' "Bridge Phase" is 60%, which translates to 120 in the sanctuary. Additionally, many of you have told me that you are fully vaccinated, and fully vaccinated individuals do not count against this figure. Our evening service will remain at 6PM, which is an opportunity for people to attend service with a small crowd (often only myself and two elders assisting with worship).

We will also remove the pew ropes and replace the Bibles and hymnals. The consensus of the most recent reports is that surface transmission is negligible, especially if you practice good hygiene. Furthermore, distancing measures beyond close, personal contact are also negligible. Six feet of distance is essentially the same as sixty feet of distance. However, please remain respectful of people who might wish to keep their distance for the time being.

We will no longer "require" face coverings in the building. It was never a requirement, but we asked for people to be respectful and act out of the principle of Christian love and self-sacrifice. This change was the most difficult decision because the recommendations are that fully vaccinated individuals do not need face coverings in most settings. This means that children and those who choose not to receive the vaccine should still keep their face coverings on. However, since there is no practical way to make this distinction, the only options are to keep a full requirement for masks or to make them optional for all. At this point, I am comfortable making face masks optional and inviting individuals to use their own best judgment as to when and how to continue their use.

Since I am fully vaccinated (and I recommend it for you also, see last month's Eagle newsletter), I will not wear my face mask for most circumstances. However, I will still carry it in my back pocket and put it on when I might be in close contact with others, such as distributing communion. I invite you to consider how you might express Christian charity in a similar way.

What will remain the same? For now Bible class and other social gatherings will remain on hold. God's Word and Sacrament are the one thing needful; all other fellowship opportunities are secondary. We hope to restore other activities in the fall, God willing.

Also, Covid has renewed the importance of personal hygiene and cleanliness in general. I will continue to take additional precautions in the distribution of the Lord's Supper, including hand washing and sanitizing, as well as sanitizing the communion chalice with high-proof alcohol. Please also continue to practice good hygiene, especially when you are feeling under the weather. What might be a mild illness for you could be serious for someone else.

Our ongoing practices, especially during cold and flu season, should also include a renewed practice of staying home when you feel ill. Similarly, I've decided that whenever I feel that little twinge of illness come on, I will not be afraid to wear a face covering until I am recovered. These two small precautions will help us avoid big changes like a complete shutdown or universal mask requirements.

We will continue to live-stream one service each weekend for those who are still not ready to return to public gatherings at this time. We will also keep some sort of service broadcast into the future, whether it's a fully live-streamed service or a recording of a portion of the service. That way, if you or your household are fighting the flu 2 years from now, you will still be able to tune in to participate.

The next few months I will write about what we can anticipate over the next months in establishing what will be normal for us going forward after the pandemic.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC — JUNE 1-30

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) officially began work in the Dominican Republic in 2004. Over the years, a group home was established to care for orphaned children with disabilities; congregations and mission plants were started; and a deaconess-training program was launched. The LCMS seminary in Santiago, Dominican Republic, trains students from around the Latin America region.

Remember God's work in the Dominican Republic as you pray:

- 1. for the seminary students who will enter the seminary this fall, that they would be able to acquire their student visas and other documentation needed to study in the Dominican Republic.
- 2. for seminary students and their families, that they would have a smooth transition to life in a new place away from family and friends. Praise God for these dedicated students who are willing to leave home to obtain a solid theological education.
- **3.** that God would grant the seminary students determination and endurance, so that they might be diligent in their studies

and make the most of their education.

- 4. for the women studying to be deaconesses, that the theological coursework and intensive practical experience would form them into capable and effective deaconesses.
- 5. that God would grant strength to our deaconesses as they support the work of pastors by caring for the poor, the marginalized and the sick.
- **6.** with thanksgiving for all the faithful and generous people who have prayed or given of their time or treasures to make the seminary and mercy center a reality.

- **7.** for the seminary professors, that they would be well-prepared to impart wisdom and knowledge to their students.
- **8.** that the Spanish-language theological library at the seminary would be well used and a blessing to the students and faculty.
- **9.** for the families of the professors, that they would adapt easily and find joy in a new country and culture.
- **10.** for Lutheran congregations in Latin America, that they would be prepared to care for and support their pastors physically, mentally and spiritually.
- 11. for seminary students who are serving vicarages, that they would learn much from their experience and be better prepared for their future ministry.
- **12.** for all the missionaries and leaders of the Dominican church, that they would discern God's

will so that they can build a firm foundation for the church for generations to come.

- **13.** that God would raise up individuals and congregations to support our LCMS missionaries in the Dominican Republic.
- 14. that God would supply faithful and capable men and women to serve as missionaries, both in Latin America and around the world.
- **15.** with thanksgiving for faithful men and women who have given up the comforts of home and family to faithfully serve on the mission field.
- 16. that many in the Dominican Republic would hear God's Word and believe in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. Pray that they would attend worship each Sunday to receive the Word and Sacraments.

- **28.** with thanksgiving for the willingness of faithful and gentle caregivers who serve the residents of Good Shepherd Lutheran Home.

- **30.** with thanksgiving that we are one in Christ with our brothers and sisters in Christ in

Latin America.

June 2021 Stewardship Newsletter from the LCMS

Christian stewardship is the free and joyous activity of the child of God and God's family, the church, in managing all of life and life's resources for God's purposes. http://www.lcms.org/stewardship

"There are three conversions necessary to every man: the head, the heart, and the purse." Attributed to Luther, though yet to be located in his vast writings, this statement echoes what Jesus taught about hearts and treasures. He said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:21; Luke 12:34)

But which conversion comes first? I submit that the order is this: first the head, then the purse, then the heart. Let's explore this topic.

Our Lord Jesus Christ dwelt among us to save us. He took on our flesh, fulfilled the demands of the law in our place, became sin for us, and suffered torture and death on our behalf. He did this in order that we would be free from sin, death, and hell. He gives us what He accomplished through Baptism, Absolution, and the Lord's Supper. And so, He doesn't just do it for us but gives it to us. He makes what He did ours by making us His. Thus, we are called by His name: Christians. We have a new life in Him.

Through the preaching of Law and Gospel, God grants us repentance, a changing of our minds. It is a conversion of the mind. We are called to turn away from our sins and turn toward Him for forgiveness, life, and salvation. For when God calls us away from something, He is, at the same time, calling us to something.

And thus, He calls us to a new life, with new deeds. This is the conversion of the purse. Jesus said that "it is easier for a camel to enter through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God." (Matthew 19:24) "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Notice that our hearts follow our treasures, not the other way around. As Christians, God calls us to invest our treasures in His Kingdom to ensure that the gospel is preached and the sacraments are administered. He calls us to share all good things with the one who teaches us the doctrines of Christ. He calls us to be generous in giving to the church, for it is more blessed to give than to receive

So where is your treasure? If it is not invested in the kingdom of God, then the only response is repentance — a conversion of the heart — and to begin doing just that. And as our Lord promised, where your treasure is there your heart will be also.

This is not to say that you earn your way into heaven. It is simply to say that as Christians, those who have been made to be temples of the Holy Spirit, who have been given a new life in Christ, who are dead to sin and now alive in Him, we are actually to live — think (conversion of the mind), do (conversion of the purse), and be (conversion of the heart) — a new life in Him. And when you fail, know that God in Christ loves and forgives you and still calls you away from that and to Himself.
