Why I Don't Do Congregational Surveys

In my first congregation, we considered the question of how many services to offer and when to offer them. I learned a lot from that experience. One of the lessons I learned was the ineffectiveness of a congregational survey. The elders of that congregation decided to survey the members to see what their preferred worship time was. It was a disaster. Not only was there no consensus, but the very act of surveying gave people the impression that their preference was what was best for the congregation. Many of them became unwilling to even consider other possibilities. So I resolved never to survey a congregation again.

So when the question of service times was put to me at St. John's by several informal discussions with members, by a formal request from the Board of Trustees, and by my own observations over the first several months of my tenure at St. John's, I decided to do something different. Last fall I put four questions to the Board of Elders in our discussion concerning the St. John's worship service schedule. In January, I asked for these questions to be put to the congregation for reflection and discussion in preparation for the next voters' meeting.

These questions are not meant to be easy. If they challenge you to broaden your horizons and think about church and ministry in new ways, then they have been successful. If they make you uncomfortable, they should. At the same time, I ask that you do not read anything into these questions. There is no hidden agenda. And there are undoubtedly other questions that would accomplish the same results, and perhaps more effectively.

The questions are: How would God, by the work of His Spirit, cause St. John's to grow using only one morning service? How would God, by the work of His Spirit, cause St. John's to grow using two morning services? Does God ever will a local congregation to reduce in size? Does God measure growth in ways other than numerical statistics?

In my Eagle newsletter articles for the coming months, I will offer my own reflections to these questions. This is an ongoing conversation, and I welcome you to continue the dialogue through your elder, which can be found on the board outside the church parlor in the undercroft.

What's Up in Worship?

Corporate Confession, Individual Absolution

If you have a hymnal at home, you can open up to page 290 and follow along.

The Rite of Corporate Confession and Absolution is an extended service of confession. It is an updated form of the Order of Confessional Service from **The Lutheran Hymnal**, which was designed for use before communion services. As a service, it can stand alone or begin a service of Holy Communion for increased attention to the nature of the Sacrament and as an expression of worthily preparing for the Lord's Supper.



The service has an option for an opening hymn of confession, which would be most appropriate when it is used as a stand alone service. The official beginning is the Invocation, which recalls the name of God and the cross that was traced upon us in our baptism. **The sign of the cross** + may be made by all In remembrance of their Baptism, states the rubric. Following the Invocation are a few short versicles from Psalm 43 and 124.

The bulk of the Rite of Corporate Confession and Absolution is the Confessional Address. It covers several themes of repentance, confession, and preparation for receiving the Sacrament of the Altar. Compare this address with the questions the Small Catechism provides on p. 329-330 of Lutheran Service Book

The confession is followed by a short blessing and the question from the pastor, "Do you believe that the forgiveness I speak is not my forgiveness by God's?" This question comes from the Small Catechism, and based upon John 20:22-23.

Then the following option is given: The pastor absolves the penitents individually at the altar, laying his hands on the head of each and pronouncing the following absolution, or he may absolve all the penitents corporately from the altar.

Because Lent is a time of increased focus on sin and repentance, I will be offering this individual absolution following our Lent midweek services. Each midweek service after Ash Wednesday will begin with the Office of Vespers. After our prayer concludes, you are invited to remain for a service of Absolution and Midweek Eucharist.

Individual absolution will function much like the Lord's Supper. Each participant in the service will come forward and kneel at the communion rail. When I approach, please state your first name and I will offer you individual absolution by name. After all are absolved, we will then share the Lord's Supper as sinners who are forgiven in Christ.

Blessed Lent to you all!



WORLDWIDE THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION — MARCH 1-31

The LCMS provides theological education throughout the world by means of seminaries and missionaries. Scholars and leaders from foreign church bodies also come to the LCMS seminaries for advanced degrees, learning sound doctrine from the Scriptures and Lutheran Confessions.

Remember the centrality of God's Word as you pray:

- 1. for Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, that all there might grow in the Word and prepare for the proper proclamation of the Word and administration of the Sacraments.
- 2. for Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind., that the faculty might teach the Word in its truth and purity; and the students learn God's Word in preparation for ministry.
- 3. for Christ's work throughout the world, that the Gospel might be proclaimed to all people and the forgiveness of sins delivered through the Means of Grace.
- 4. for Concordia Seminary, Hong Kong, that people and

pastors might be trained there to proclaim the Gospel.

- 5. for Martin Luther Seminary in Lae, Papua New Guinea, that God would strengthen and preserve the seminary to prepare the pastors of the Gutnius Lutheran Church to convict people with God's law and heal them with the word of Absolution.
- **6.** for Japan Lutheran Seminary in Tokyo, Japan, that our Lord, Jesus Christ, would make the seminary a place where the Word of God is taught in its truth and purity.
- 7. for Concordia Theological Seminary in Nagercoil, India, that the Lord would preserve the seminary from all evil and lead it to become a bastion of the

Gospel against the attacks of the wicked foe.

- 8. for Timothy Lutheran Seminary in Birip, Papua New Guinea, that the Lord would use the instructors to shine His Word upon the path of students preparing to serve His Church.
- 9. for students and professors of Lutheran Theological Seminary in Baguio City, Philippines, that they might serve the Lutheran Church in the Philippines faithfully.
- **10.** for Luther Seminary in Seoul, South Korea, that the Lord would preserve those who teach and those who learn to hold fast to His Word in all circumstances.
- 11. for the ministry carried out through the Westfield House of Theological Studies in Cambridge, England, as this ministry trains church leaders for England and many other church bodies around the world.

12. for the Lutheran Center for Theological Studies (CLET) in Togo, that theological training for men from French-speaking countries in West Africa might continue.

13. for Concordia Reformer Seminary, Dominican Republic, that the students there might share the Gospel throughout Latin and South America.

14. for the Synod's Global Seminary Initiative (GSI), which helps to fill the need for trained church leaders who are native to the region and cultures in which they serve, that God would guide this program to strengthen the formation of pastors and deaconesses around the world.

15. for LCMS professors and pastors who travel overseas to teach seminars and intensive courses for our current and emerging church partners, that God would grant them safe travel and fruitful labors.

March 2020 Stewardship Newsletter from the LCMS



We are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts, the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God, those that pertain to this body and life.

In other words, it reminds us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every desire of our flesh but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

The easiest example of this is fasting. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned. You have, though, learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above in order to do it.

There is another example of this. It is alms-giving. This is an increase in giving to the church and its mission during this time. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is in leading you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

"But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs." (1 Tim 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season.
