Introducing the Catechumenate: Time of Catechesis

Catechesis is the word that has been used to describe the Church's way of teaching the faith. It comes from a word that means "with an echo." *Catechesis* is a method of teaching where a *catechist* asks a question of a *catechumen*, who responds to the question. Catechesis is a holy conversation about the Christian faith.

In the Catechumenate, catechesis happens whenever two or more people take part in a conversation about the Christian faith. But the dedicated Time of Catechesis is more focused. An early Time of Catechesis can preceded enrollment in the Catechumenate, where catechumens and sponsors spend time discussing Scripture based on the weekly readings. This is a time to familiarize catechumens with the basic stories of Scripture and to provide opportunities to ask deeper questions.

An intense Time of Catechesis also happens between the Rite of Enrollment and the Rites of Initiation. Also called a Time of Preparation, in the ancient Church this time occurred during the season of Lent and was dedicated to giving the Creed (usually the Apostles' Creed) and the Lord's Prayer. In addition, catechumens were asked if they renounced the devil and all his works and all his ways. These practices are still included for us in our rites of Holy Baptism, Confirmation, and Baptismal Remembrance.

In contemporary applications of the ancient catechumenate, the time between the Rite of Enrollment and the Rites of Initiation is given to preparation for Baptism, Confirmation, and fellowship in the Eucharist. In the Lutheran Church, this means a sharp focus on the six Chief Parts of the Catechism.

Beginning March 6th, during our Bible study hour at 9:30AM on Sundays, we will gather together as a congregation for this Time of Catechesis and Preparation. I will be asking all members of the congregation to begin thinking of themselves as sponsors for those who are beginning their walk of faith. Please consider giving your support to our newest brothers and sisters in Christ during our Time of Catechesis.



WORLDWIDE THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION — MARCH 1-31

The LCMS provides theological education throughout the world by means of seminaries and missionaries. Scholars and leaders from foreign church bodies also come to the LCMS seminaries for advanced degrees, learning sound doctrine from the Scriptures and Lutheran Confessions.

Remember the centrality of God's Word as you pray:

- 1. for Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, that all there might grow in the Word and prepare for the proper proclamation of the Word and administration of the Sacraments.
- 2. for Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind., that the faculty might teach the Word in its truth and purity; and the students learn God's Word in preparation for ministry.
- 3. for Christ's work throughout the world, that the Gospel might be proclaimed to all people and the forgiveness of sins delivered through the Means of Grace.
- 4. for Concordia Seminary, Hong Kong, that people and

pastors might be trained there to proclaim the Gospel.

- 5. for Martin Luther Seminary in Lae, Papua New Guinea, that God would strengthen and preserve the seminary to prepare the pastors of the Gutnius Lutheran Church to convict people with God's law and heal them with the word of Absolution.
- **6.** for Japan Lutheran Seminary in Tokyo, Japan, that our Lord, Jesus Christ, would make the seminary a place where the Word of God is taught in its truth and purity.
- 7. for Concordia Theological Seminary in Nagercoil, India, that the Lord would preserve the seminary from all evil and lead it to become a bastion of the

Gospel against the attacks of the wicked foe.

- 8. for Timothy Lutheran Seminary in Birip, Papua New Guinea, that the Lord would use the instructors to shine His Word upon the path of students preparing to serve His Church.
- 9. for students and professors of Lutheran Theological Seminary in Baguio City, Philippines, that they might serve the Lutheran Church in the Philippines faithfully.
- **10.** for Luther Seminary in Seoul, South Korea, that the Lord would preserve those who teach and those who learn to hold fast to His Word in all circumstances.
- 11. for the ministry carried out through the Westfield House of Theological Studies in Cambridge, England, as this ministry trains church leaders for England and many other church bodies around the world.

- 12. for the Lutheran Center for Theological Studies (CLET) in Togo, that theological training for men from French-speaking countries in West Africa might continue.
- **13.** for Concordia Reformer Seminary, Dominican Republic, that the students there might share the Gospel throughout Latin and South America.
- 14. for the Synod's Global Seminary Initiative (GSI), which helps to fill the need for trained church leaders who are native to the region and cultures in which they serve, that God would guide this program to strengthen the formation of pastors and deaconesses around the world.
- 15. for LCMS professors and pastors who travel overseas to teach seminars and intensive courses for our current and emerging church partners, that God would grant them safe travel and fruitful labors.

- 16. for the international students who come to the Synod's seminaries, that God would grant safe travels and comfort while away from family and friends.
- 17. for Lutheran pastors worldwide, that they would have access to the necessary books and resources to teach Law and Gospel.

- **29.** for seminarians' wives, that they would be prepared to support their husband's call into ministry.
- **30.** for seminarians' children, that they rejoice in the Gospel and in their father's calling.
- **31.** for all who listen to those who receive theological education, that the Gospel might take root and produce fruit.

March 2022 Stewardship Newsletter from the LCMS

Everything we have and everything we are is a gift of God's providential care. We understand that we're not islands unto ourselves, that we could not exist without those who have gone before us and are alongside us. God has given us forefathers in family, country, and faith. We are recipients of what God worked through them. We know that God provides for our well-being through these means.

He gives us farmers and ranchers of all sorts so that we can eat. But more than that God created and gave us all the things that those farmers and ranchers cultivate. He gave us the corn, the beans, the wheat, the cows for milking, the steers for grilling. He gave each of those things, properties for our nourishment and sustenance. Without God creating and instilling in those things their taste and their nutritional value, we would not exist.

He gives us doctors, surgeons, nurses, and hospitals. He gives us medicine and medical instruments. Again, he gave us all things that go into making those medicines and medical instruments. He instilled in those things the properties that can be utilized for that purpose. Without God creating and instilling those healing properties into those things, and without God creating the ability within man to find this out and press it into service of our medical needs, we would not enjoy the kind of health we do now.

But there's more. He gives us gainful employment through our employers and provides for the necessities of life through the labor of our hands: "Then Moses said to the people of Israel, 'See, the Lord has called by name Bezalel the son of Uri, son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah; and he has filled him with the Spirit of God, with skill, with intelligence, with knowledge, and with all craftsmanship, to devise artistic designs, to work in gold and silver and bronze, in cutting stones for setting, and in carving wood, for work in every skilled craft. And he has inspired him to teach, both him and Oholiab the son of Ahisamach of the tribe of Dan.' "(Exodus 35:30–34)

And one step back from that, He has created and given us hands. And attached to those hands are arms with strength. He created us with minds in order to make those arms and hands move to accomplish the work set before us. And He has given us reason and senses. That mind, because of the reason God has instilled in it, is able to work through difficult problems before we press those arms and hands into labor. It allows us to grapple with concepts and run through scenarios instead of having to experience every situation personally. It allows us to learn from the mistakes as well as the accomplishments of others. This can be done for our entire body, all our skills and talents, everything that makes us ... us. So that everything we have AND everything we are is a gift from Him. This is what we confess in the First Article of the Creed when we say that we believe in God the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

But that is just the First Article of the Creed. We confess two more articles that deal with God's provision for our spiritual well-being. That He sent His son to die and be raised on the third day for our justification. That He delivers that justification through the Means of Grace (Baptism, preaching, the Word of God, and the Lord's Supper). And to give you those Means of Grace, He gives pastors and teachers, etc. Again, this could be expanded and expounded upon. So that literally everything that we have and everything that we are — in this life and the next — is an inexpressible gift from God.

And it is for this, all of this, that we give thanks. And that is what stewardship is all about — giving thanks for God's provision for us. To give thanks is more than having an attitude of gratitude, more than just a feeling in our hearts. It is an action. It begins in the heart, but it doesn't stay there. It works its way out through the mouth in praise for God's gifts and in love and charity through the hands to our neighbors in family, country, and church. "For all this is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey him" (Luther's Small Catechism, 16).

So give thanks to God for His inexpressible gift — for everything we have and everything we are. Do this not in word only but also in deed.
