Numbers in the left margin refer to pages in the pew hymnal, *Lutheran Service Book*. You may wish to place ribbon bookmarks at the pages for liturgy and hymns.

The Introit, Gradual, Collect, and Readings for the day are printed on the folder insert, along with devotional material for the week.

Introduce yourself to our Pastor, if it’s your first time with us; and all are encouraged to greet and get to know their fellow worshipers.



A WORD CONCERNING HOLY COMMUNION

In Holy Communion, we joyfully receive Christ’s Body & Blood for our forgiveness, life, and salvation. In participating, we publicly confess our unity in Christ’s Body, and a harmony of teaching and practice. Congregations of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod have promised to practice close communion. Guests who desire to commune with us for the first time are asked to speak with the pastor before the service, to answer any questions you may have.

You may also wish to review Luther’s “Christian Questions with Their Answers,” on pp. 329-330 in *Lutheran Service Book*, and refer to the “Before worship” and “Before communing” prayers inside the front cover of LSB.

If you are not in fellowship with our Synod, you are invited to come forward for a blessing. Simply indicate that by folding your arms over your heart while at the communion rail.



WORSHIPPING WITH THE HISTORIC LITURGY

Liturgy derives from the word *leitourgia*, which was a word in the ancient world to describe the service of an individual on behalf of the public. It is not merely an order of service. In the historic Christian liturgy, the individual who provides the service is our Lord, Jesus Christ, and service is provided through His Word and Sacraments. The orders of service we employ from *Lutheran Service Book* (LSB) are ways to arrange this twin service of Word and Sacrament, with roots that reach back to the earliest days of the Christian Church.

In our service, both congregation and pastor chant much of the order of the liturgy. The custom of singing God’s Word is not new, but has its beginnings in the worship of God’s people in the Old Testament. St. Paul, in Ephesians 5:19 and Colossians 3:16 instructs us to sing “psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs.” Singing and God’s Word go together.

The rhythm of the Church’s year of grace can be found on LSB p. x-xi.

A chart of the Lectionary (series of readings) can be found on LSB p. xx-xxiii.

A Glossary of liturgical terms can be found on LSB p. xxiv-xxv. This glossary will help you with the vocabulary of the liturgy.

THE CATECHUMENATE

From the earliest days of the Christian Church, the catechumenate has served as the process for initiating the Christian life and reception into the fellowship of the Church by Baptism, Confirmation, and participation in the Eucharist (Lord’s Supper).

The heart of the catechumenate is a course of study and reflection called *Didache* (dih - dah - KAY; Greek for “teaching”), which explores the themes of God and humanity (Ten Commandments); God’s work on our behalf (Apostles’ Creed); prayer (Lord’s Prayer); God’s sacramental encounter with us (Holy Baptism, Confession, Sacrament of the Altar); and living a Christian life.

Inquirers who would like to further their journey in the Christian faith are invited to speak with our pastor about enrolling in the catechumenate.



GENEROSITY

Luke 11:21-22 – “When a strong man, fully armed, guards his own palace, his goods are safe; but when one stronger than he attacks him and overcomes him, he takes away his armor in which he trusted and divides his spoil.” Jesus has disarmed Satan in a most unusual way: He has disarmed him by allowing Satan to cast all his weapons into Jesus. Satan has nothing left to attack us with; he spent it all on Jesus. And now Jesus is our Stronger Man. He guards and keeps us and ours, and we have nothing to fear.

GOD’S WORD FOR TODAY

Jesus Overcomes the Strong Man. Jeremiah was charged with speaking evil when he spoke the Word of the Lord (Jer. 26:1–15). So also, Jesus is accused of doing evil when in fact He is doing good. He casts out a demon from a mute man so that he is able to speak (Luke 11:14–28). But some said Jesus did this by the power of Beelzebub, Satan. Like Pharaoh of old, their hearts were hard (Ex. 8:16–24). They did not recognize the finger of God, the power of the Holy Spirit at work in and through Jesus. Jesus is the Stronger Man who overcomes the strong man. He takes the devil’s armor of sin and death and destroys it from the inside out by the holy cross. He exorcizes and frees us by water and the Word. We were once darkness, but now we are light in Christ the Lord (Eph. 5:1–9). As children of light, our tongues are loosed to give thanks to Him who saved us.
